


SURVIVAL FISHING




Listen for frogs when darkness falls; they, too like to stick close to water.


FISHING WEIR TRAPS

Fish weirs are human-made fish traps that have been used for centuries to catch fish.


They can be made out of anything from stone, reeds or wooden posts and they're placed strategically in river channels or tidal lagoons.

These fish traps are typically on rivers or streams and are shaped either circular or wedgeshaped and need an upstream opening. The basics of how they work is the fish swim in and are trapped within the upstream of the current.

Tidal fish traps are usually built with blocks or boulders and have solid low walls. At high tides fish swim alongside the tops of the walls and as the water recedes with the tide, they are trapped behind it.







GILL NETS

Gill nets can be a fisherman's best friend. They allow you to set and forget it. Leaving you free to do other jobs while your gill net does the work.

As easy and simple as this may sound there are a few considerations to remember. The most important thing to remember is to tie the right mesh size for the fish you're targeting.
